East Chapel Hill High student Pristine Onuoha won the eighth national Genes in Space STEM competition.

Onuoha seeks to understand the mechanism behind telomere lengthening, a chromosomal change that has been observed in space travelers.

Her experiment will be performed by astronauts aboard the International Space Station next year.

Telomeres are structures that protect DNA from damage, and shorten with age and wear.

Surprisingly, telomere lengthening has been observed in space travelers, notably Astronaut Scott Kelly, the subject of NASA's Twin Study.

Onuoha's experiment will explore the possibility that telomere lengthening is caused by a space-induced proliferation of stem cells.

Onuoha developed her proposal with guidance from her teacher, Kimberly

In their company, Onuoha will travel to NASA's Kennedy Space Center to watch her experiment launch to space in 2023.

Onuoha's proposal was selected from a competitive field of 602 submissions from 1,175 students across the U.S.

Authors of the top five proposals were invited to ident present their ideas to a distinguished panel of scientists, educators, and technologists at the ISS Re-search & Development Conference in Washington,
